Enrolment for 2024 classes begins on **Tuesday 5th December from 10am, no one can enrol prior to this**. The system is locked until 10am that day. Committee and volunteer staff also cannot enrol before this time. Being away on holiday or unwell will NOT help you jump the queue! Remember you can ask a friend to enrol for you.

The best way to enrol is via your computer, lap top, ipad or phone using UMAS

If you come into U3A to enrol, collect a **Number card** from near the lounge area. If you don't have an enrolment form there will be plenty available (good time to collect this is at the Christmas break up on Friday 1st December). **Please wear your membership badge or know your number.** If paying by cash try and bring the correct amount **\$65.** Helpers will be available in room 41 to answer questions and the tech people will call you across to enrol you in your courses, according to your number card.

A small staff of volunteers will be available 10am - 12md for the remainder of enrolment week and the following (Mon 11th - Fri 15th).

You can collect your course enrolment and 2024 badge if you are coming to a Summer School class. from Monday 15th January 10 - 12md. All confirmation details/badges not picked up by the end of Summer School will be posted out. Your new badge is also on this form so cut it off and put it in your lanyard.

We are closed from 18th December until Summer School begins on Monday 15th January

Please ensure that Membership payments are received by end of Summer School. This can be done either online by bank transfer (making sure that your payment is identifiable with your name or number) or at U3A Bentleigh by bankcard or cash. Alternatively pay at your local Bendigo Bank branch.

Note: Some banks are already refusing to accept cheques so PLEASE do not write a cheque unless you know that your bank will honour it.



U3A Visits Tasmania

Last month a group of 27 U3A Bentleigh members, along with friends from the **Bayside Brighton Life Activities Club**, made their first interstate trip over to Tasmania. They were off to an early start and got ahead of the traffic for a quick check-in and flight to Launceston where they were met by their Redline coach and driver Laurie. Laurie was born and grew up in Tasmania and had a wealth of knowledge to relay to the group as they began their 8 day trip. Organizer **Pat Cahill** tells us;

Driving along the East coast, we traveled via Scottsdale and St. Helen's and stayed the night in **Scamander** where we enjoyed comfortable rooms with magnificent ocean views. A huge breakfast set us up for the drive next morning to the beautiful Georgian village of **Richmond** which is classified by the National Trust. We saw the famous Richmond stone span bridge built by convicts with the foundation stone being laid in 1823 (completed in 1825) and still in use today. Also of note was a great ice cream shop!!

A short drive took us into **Hobart** where we stayed for 2 nights. That first evening saw the group wining and dining on a Derwent River cruise while taking in the night lights of the city. The following morning we drove down to **Port Arthur**, the 19th Century penal colony which is now preserved as an open air museum. Many of the homes, jails and administration buildings are still intact and can be explored. Following a short boat trip over to the Isle of the Dead, we returned to Hobart for a free evening to investigate the many eating places along the Hobart wharf and indulge in fresh sea food like Mure's restaurant.

Heading West, we left Hobart and for **Queenstown**, where we stayed 2 nights. We took in a trip to Russell Falls and Lake St. Clair National Park where it began snowing. What a great opportunity for photos and a morning tea to keep us warm and content. Leaving the National Park we drove across to **Strahan** on the Tasmanian West coast and boarded a boat for the Gordon River wilderness cruise; a highlight of our trip. We discovered Sarah Island, an old convict settlement where we were entertained and informed of dramatic tales by a local guide.

Queenstown, once a rich mining town when gold was discovered in the 19th century, is now denuded by over logging, sulphur and fires giving the area a barren "moonscape" vista. The first morning we headed off on a shuttle bus to the contrasingt and breath-taking vistas of the World Heritage Site, to view a snow capped **Cradle Mountain**; a great chance to stretch our legs and take photos. Driving back we visited Sheffield known as 'The Town of Murals'

Our final over night stop was back at Launceston and a stay in the picturesque Swiss style village of Grindlewald where we had a final opportunity to enjoy a buffet meal together then an early night before heading back to Melbourne. We had a great time, got to see the wonderful natural sights of Tasmania and made new friends.

Thank you Pat, Kathy and Priya for organizing such a great trip and we look forward to hearing what you are offering members and friends in 2024.









Easy Fruit Cake

INGREDIENTS

500 gms mixed dried fruit
1/4 cup mixed peel
1 cup drained crushed tin pineapple*
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup fruit juice (a choice of apple, apricot, pineapple or carrot)
1 1/2 cup Wholemeal SR flour
1tea spoon mixed spice
1tea spoon Bicarb soda

METHOD

Oven 180C or fan forced 160C Grease and line a loaf tin.

Soak fruit in juice overnight (add 1/4 cup sherry or brandy if desired)

Mix in flour, spice, nuts, pineapple and soda Cook approx 1 - 1 1/2 hours

- Can replace pineapple with cooked mashed pumpkin,
- grated carrot or apple

This recipe freezes well. Has no egg or butter

Sea Food Sauce

150 mls thickenedcream
150 mls tomato ketchup or sauce
1 tea spoon Worcestershire sauce
10 drop Tabasco sauce
Cayenne pepper to sprinkle
Optional: 1 tablespoon Brandy

Avril's Genuine Scottish Shortbread

125 gms butter 4 table spoon rice flour 125 gms margarine 2/3 cup plain flour pinch of salt

Method

Oven on at 170 C

Line baking tray with aluminium foil or baking paper. Put all ingredients on a bowl and ensure the butter & margarine are at room temperature

Blend all together till a consistent texture.

Place a manageable portion of dough onto a floured board & press firmly together.

Roll out to desired thickness & cut into preferred shape. Use all the remaining dough.

Place gently onto baking tray leaving small space to spread. Prick surface with a fork.

Check after 15 mins, turn tray then 10 mins more till golden. Allow to cool

Method

Gently beat the cream to thicken but not form peaks. Stir in remaining ingredients. Dress seafood or serve on the side. Cayenne to decorate.
